

#### Sir John Cass Pupil Premium Impact Report 2017-18

#### Context

The pupil premium is available to Schools and Academies to provide additional support for students in receipt of free school meals or who have been eligible for free school meals at any point in the last six years. Looked after children, children adopted from care attract a slightly higher rate of funding while there is a smaller amount of funding provided for the children of service personnel.

99% of the pupils at Sir John Cass who receive pupil Premium funding do so because of the free school meals criteria. In 2017-18 the breakdown of eligible pupils was:

Sir John Cass has a high percentage of pupil premium students; 61% compared to the national average of 28%. This places the school in the highest FSM eligibility band. The school is measured on the performance of our pupil premium students in comparison with non-pupil premium students. The school spends the funding on ensuring pupil premium students achieve outstanding achievement and progress that is at least in line if not exceeding that of our non-pupil premium students.

Attainment 8 is the average measure of each individual student's attainment across their 8 best performing subjects at GCSE. This table shows that again whilst pupil premium students have attained good grades there is still a small gap between PP and non PP.

The school has performed well overall however there is still a gap in attainment that we continue to address. Our pupil premium students continue to achieve a much higher rate than the national average.
